Did you know... Activist Autumn Peltier was just eight years old when she began advocating for the universal right to clean water. Growing up on Wiikwemkoong on Manitoulin Island, she learned about the importance of clean water from her mom and her aunt and that many Indigenous communities across Canada don't have access to it. Now 15, she has accomplished a lot.
